What is the Family Empowerment Program?

The Family Empowerment program was created to provide individuals and families of the YHC with Individualized Supportive Services, which is done by working with our residents to promote self-sufficiency in three key areas - employment, education, and health/wellness.

What can the FEP help with?

FEP staff have varying focus areas, ranging from mental health coordination, education and wellness, senior support, and permanent supportive housing. Available services are quite varied: FEP hosts 6 food pantries a month (Sauk Trail, Hollow Creek, Towner), provides GED courses, afterschool tutoring, transportation, game nights, community events, case management, mental health counseling, financial literacy, and referrals for furniture, home essentials, car repair, assistance with DTE bills, and much more.

Who should I contact for support?

Each YHC community has FEP staff present. Listed below are the staff members in each community. In the event of a crisis, we encourage residents to contact any available FEP staff member in addition to appropriate first responders (EMT, fire department, police department, etc...).

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RESIDENT COUNCIL BOARD MEMBER ELECTION TIME LINE

Election Workers: We are looking for volunteers to oversee the Resident Council Election Process. Election Workers are not allowed to run for a seat on the Resident Council Board. If you wish to volunteer, please reach out to Christa Hughbanks.

Nominations: Beginning (Date TBD), we will start accepting nominations for the Resident Council Board Elections. Anyone can submit nominations. Submitting a nomination means that you believe or have someone in mind who would be a great candidate to serve on the Resident Council Board. The last day nominations will be accepted (Date TBD)

Nomination Acceptance: On (Date TBD), Nominations will be posted, and everyone nominated to serve on the board will have a chance to accept their nominations.

Campaign: Begining (Date TBD), everyone who has accepted their nomination will have a chance to campaign for 30 days. If any candidate needs assistance

Election: Starting (Date TBD), residents can vote on who they believe would be a great fit as a strong Future Resident Council Board Member. Ballots will be distributed to everyone's mailbox, and everyone will have two weeks to submit ballots to the Strong Future Ballot Drop Box.

Results: On (Date TBD), the Newly Elected Strong Future Resident Council will be announced, And the first official Resident Council Meeting will be set.

Resident Council Fact Sheet

Resident Council Member:

Every resident who resides in the community over 18 and on a residential lease is automatically a part of the resident Council. There will be monthly resident council meetings, where residents can come together and discuss various ways to improve their communities. All residents who qualify are encouraged to partake in the resident council meeting as this is a way to be a leader, advocate for resources for your community, and help your family and neighbors enjoy a higher quality of life.

<u>Resident Council Board:</u>

To serve as a resident council Board Member, residents must be elected by fellow resident council members. The Role of a Resident Council Board is to act officially as a liaison between the YHC and Resident Council. The Board will be Responsible for Holding resident Council Meetings, Setting Agendas, Voting on Matters, and Communicating the resident Council needs and concerns to Property Management and the YHC.

Benefits of Resident Council to Residents

- Makes a stronger and safer Community to live in.
- Makes decisions that affect you.
- Serves as a Voice for the residents.
- Represents the interest of all residents.
- Can link the resident to other resources around the community.
- Provides a means in which tenants' concerns can be prioritized and addressed.
- Can address concerns for residents with the YHC staff.
- Helps to educate and inform residents of grievances and other issues or projects on the property to keep residents up to date on that process.
- Provides a place where issues can be discussed and information distributed.
- Provides a way to organize projects and programs.
- Serves as a communication link to advocate the issues and concerns of residents.
- Support and promote programs and services, including applying for and receiving grants.
- Help builds a positive relationship with the YHC, businesses, churches, and other community organizations.


